I appreciated the opportunity to visit with many of the people we support, some family members and CLS staff. I was very impressed with all the hard work and commitment to making the holidays a joyful experience for everyone. Also, back by popular demand this year, the CLS hosted *A Very Elvis Christmas Lunch* with an Elvis impersonator on December 3rd. It was enjoyed by over 200 people, and we will yet again need to find a larger venue for next year.



Late Life Planning Project

CLS received a grant from Community Living BC to prepare an *Easy Read - Late Life Planning Guide* for the people we support and their personal support networks. We retained a consultant to work with two self-advocates, Carol Erkila and Byron Schiller, to develop the guide. The guide is now complete and was presented to BC CEO Network member organizations across the province at a meeting on January 23rd. CLS has also completed our pilot project on Late Life Planning that included the development of resource materials, policies and training of all CLS Leaders. The planning process will now be rolled out to all applicable Supported Individuals and their personal support network members over the next few months. Housing

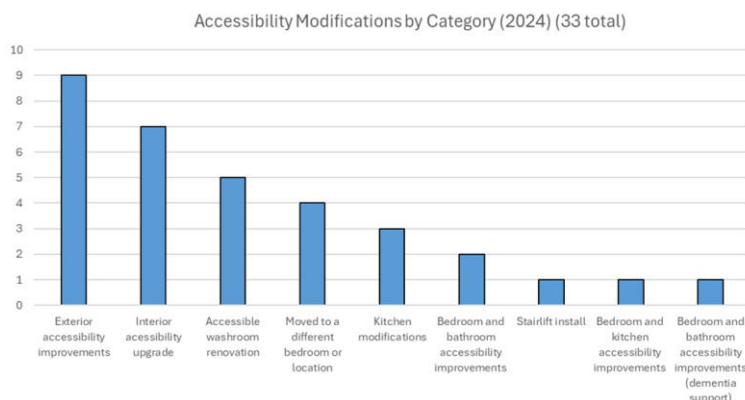
Housing is one of the 4 strategic directives in our Strategic Plan and therefore has been a focus this past year to ensure that appropriate housing is available for the people we support. The population of the people we support is changing and many of the CLS's homes are aging. As such, we are prioritizing housing projects that address these issues which include updating, selling and purchasing more appropriate homes, as well as the complete redevelopment of some homes.

We are pleased that the redevelopment of the home on Ross Road in North Vancouver is almost complete. This new home will replace an old two-story home with a new wheelchair accessible home. It has taken longer than expected for many different reasons, but the construction is now scheduled for completion on March 14th. We have learned a lot from this redevelopment and will apply this knowledge to future projects.

Speaking of future projects, the Nelson home in Burnaby is one of the oldest properties in CLS' housing portfolio and no longer fits the needs of the people living there. In partnership with BC Housing, CLS has engaged an architect and has completed the design phase for the new home which will feature full accessible 4-bedroom main home and a separate one-bedroom suite. We are meeting with the people living at Nelson and their families to begin the planning for this exciting redevelopment.

The two Keith Road homes in North Vancouver will both have extensive renovations to the bathrooms and kitchen this Spring. This renovation will start in March and is expected to be completed by June, 2025.

The CLS also monitors accessibility needs through our annual Accessibility Plan. In 2024, the Property and Fleet team, in collaboration with the Quality Assurance department, developed an Accessibility Audit in alignment with both national and international accessibility standards. This audit aims to evaluate and quantify the accessibility of each CLS-owned, operated, or leased location. In 2024, CLS made 33 modifications to homes to improve accessibility.



The homes that CLS owns are not the only way that we are supporting the housing needs of the people we support. We have been actively developing partnerships with housing providers to gain access to affordable housing at Persons with Disabilities (PWD) shelter rates for the people we support. Often the people we support want to live independently with support from CLS, but housing affordability is the barrier to realizing this choice.

Our housing partnerships remove this barrier and help people realize their dreams. We now have partnerships with 4 housing providers and will be adding some new independent living options for people in the early part of 2025.

Training

Person-Centered Active Support is the foundation of the way in which our staff provide support. The tenants of Person-Centered Active Support guides our staff to provide just enough of the right amount of support to enable people to take part in meaningful activities and relationships. This support philosophy was adopted by the CLS 9 years ago and forms the foundation of how we expect our employees to support the individuals we serve. We will be inviting Julie Beadle Brown back the CLS to provide further training on this support philosophy in the early Spring at several training sessions, one of which will be for all CLS employees. This is the first time CLS has provided an all-employee training session, and we are excited to be spending March 31st together learning and connecting.



Julie Beadle-Brown is currently The PAVE Project Manager with the California Community Living Network and Emeritus Professor in Intellectual and Developmental Disability at the University of Kent, UK. She has over 30 years' experience as a teacher, researcher and consultant

working with individuals, families, staff, service providers, schools, clinicians and with local and national governments internationally. She has worked on supporting organizations to evaluate, improve and maintain the quality of the services they provide with a particular focus on delivering person-centered support in the community that improves the quality of life of the people they support and the experiences of families and direct support professionals. Julie is one of the original authors of training and many publications on Person-Centered Active Support and is passionate about sharing this approach to enabling and empowering people with disabilities to have the best possible lives.

The kitchen at the 28th Street home was in desperate need for an upgrade. It was the original kitchen from when the home was bought and had an outdated and compact feel. Everyone was very excited when we received the notice that the kitchen would be updated. With any renovation comes a lot of hard work and planning. The two ladies who live there needed to be out of the kitchen for 4 weeks. Therefore, a kitchenette was set up in the living room and catered food brought to the home. Ashleigh was very happy that there was a coffee machine in her living room!

Despite the large change in routine and environment, Rhian and Ashleigh adapted well and enjoyed watching the progress of their kitchen! After 4 weeks, the kitchen was finished. It provides more space, accessibility, and light into the room. Now there is more room for cooking and baking, which both ladies enjoy doing. Ashleigh and Rhian are very thankful for their new kitchen and look forward to all of the memories and fun that will be created.

Vandana Goyal

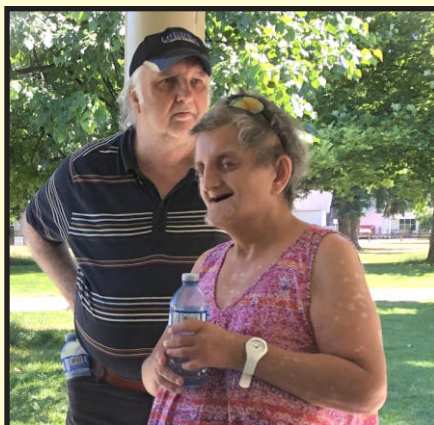
June 10, 1963 – October 19, 2024

All of us will miss her dearly, especially Ed.

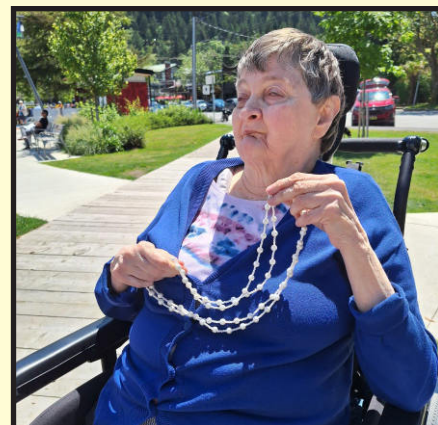


Sonya Kulhanek
